### Welcome to Arcana & Minn-Con!

It's mid-to-late October. The leaves are russet, the apples crisp, and ancient evil strives to break back into the world. It's time for Arcana... Our story so far: in 1968 three devotees of the H.P. Lovecaft/Weird Tales/Arkham House horror tradition—including author John J. Koblas (1942-2013)—started hanging out. About August 14, 1971, they were joined by two more fans for the first official Minn-Con, the five of them pledging to recruit others. Whenever several of the fellowship gathered for some activity—usually, though not always, horror-related—they called it a Minn-Con. There would eventually be over 150 Minn-Cons, as well as some out-of-town activities, including Spooncons in Spooner, Wisconsin. In the fall of 1971 they held the first annual weekend in members' houses, which they called Oktoberfest. Over the years, these Minn-Cons and Oktoberfests attracted horror, fantasy, and science fiction authors, artists, scholars, musicians, and fans. Somewhere in the mid-'80s the name Minn-Con attached itself to both the regular and annual gatherings. In 1987 Minn-Con, surviving a schism, started holding annual fall gatherings at hotels, evolving from a large gathering to a small convention. In 1992 the convention settled into the hotel beside Bandana Square—the Sunwood Inn-Holiday Inn Express-Best Western-now Best Western Plus—where it happily resides for its 25TH CONSECUTIVE YEAR. In 1994, to avoid confusion with a larger and slightly older Twin Cities science fiction convention, Minicon, we changed Minn-Con's name to Arcana, "A Convention of the Dark Fantastic." To preserve its rich history, Arcana has retained the original numbering from Oktoberfests, and our Sponsoring Organization is Minn-Con. Meeting in hotels, Minn-Con/Arcana has drawn 32-70 warm bodies, defining the compact edge of what is, in fact, a full service convention. Arcana 46's Programming centers around our Guest of Honor, Kathe Koja, and her interests, including writing, theater, and puppets. Saturday night she will do a performance, The Art of Darkness: A Participatory Fiction.Other topics include "What are You Reading," "What are You Viewing," "Star Trek Dark," a centennial appreciation of Shirley Jackson, "The Art of Jon Arfstrom," the true-life macabre, our "Weird Robin Readings," and our Silver Edition reminiscences of Bandana Square. There will be late night conversation, media, and snacks in Krushenko's. The Minn-Con Auction, this time Saturday, 4:00-6:00 p.m., will steal the show. Read through this Program Book for other





amenities. Our Sponsoring Organization meets not-quite-monthly, usually early Sunday afternoons, to plan the next Arcana, to socialize, and to share our love of the Dark Fantastic. The next Arcana/Minn-Con meeting will be Sunday, December 4, noon-1ish p.m. at East Lake Library, 27th Ave S & Lake St E, Minneapolis. We'll do an Arcana 46 Post-Mortem, and moves things along for Arcana 47. Join us for fellowship, whether or not you want to work on the convention. If you enjoy this hotel, try the Western convention, Con-Sarnit, early June 2017, and the speculative fiction convention, Diversicon, July 21-23, 2017. Diversicon Sponsor SF Minnesota will hold its annual Classic Horror Films Party Saturday, November 5, 2016, 2:30 p.m.-midnight, in the same hotel on the same dates as MarsCon's Masquerade Ball. The theme for this year's Classic Horror Films Party is "Classic Horror Comedies of the '60s and '70s.' See the orange flier on the Arcana freebie table for details of this and other fall events.

Hotel: The Best Western Plus—Bandana Square has a swimming pool, sauna, free internet computer & free wireless, lobby & 2nd floor ice machines, & a 24-hour convenience cubby nestled behind hotel registration. The hotel is built inside a historic train repair shop, with original wooden beams, and train tracks running through the lobby. There is a free breakfast, hot and cold, in the lobby for hotel registrants. Check-in-time is 3 p.m.; check-out is noon. The Waiting Room (1st floor) serves pizza, snacks, and hard and soft drinks Monday-Saturday, 4-9 p.m. It has recently extended its hours as a lounge in times when the bar isn't open. The Best Western Plus is located next to historic Bandana Square, which contains the Twin City Model Railroad Museum (2nd floor, admission \$6). A nearby restaurant with a varied menu is Gabe's by the Park, 991 Lexington Pkwy N (about three blocks from the hotel). There is a wide variety of restaurants within 2-3 miles. On Sunday, Arcana will do a coordinated dinner expedition to Tavern on the Grand after Closing Ceremonies (see schedule).

Live Programming will be in our "Mainstage," Soo Line Room, 1st floor.

Our Vendor Room will be in the Milwaukee Road Room, 1st floor. (next to Mainstage). Hours: 3-7:30 p.m. Friday, 10: a.m.-5 p.m. Saturday. 11 a.m.-3p.m. Sunday. Featuring books, magazines, films, artwork, and other Dark Fantastic items to die for. This year's dealers include Greg Ketter, DreamHaven Books; Steve Fastner and Rich Larson, artists/illustrators; Lydia Perlick, Faeward Inn (iridescent fantasy wings); Dwayne H. Olson, Fedogan & Bremer (book publishers); and Eric M. Heideman, Tales of the Unanticipated (original anthologies).

Arcana Hospitality, under the direction of Sybill M. Smith, will periodically put out food and beverages in the Vendor Room (Milwaukee Road) through Saturday afternoon; thereafter in the Mainstage (Soo Line).

Krushenko's (Room 101) is open Friday and Saturday evenings after the live Programming ends, combining conversation, media, and light refreshments (see Program Schedule). On Sunday Krushenko's will be one of the locations of the Undead Dog Party 7:15 p.m.-late night (see schedule).





### **GUEST OF HONOR: KATHE KOJA**

Kathe Koja grew up in Detroit. She began writing short stories for various anthologies and magazines before publishing her first novel, The Cipher from Dell Abyss in 1991. It went on to win the Stoker Award and a Locus Award that year. Her other horror novels include Bad Brains, Skin, Strange Angels and Kink. Her work explores some of the darkest corners of the human mind and



obsessive behavior. Some of her short fiction has been collected in Extremities.

The second stage of her career began with Straydog, a young adult novel. She followed that with Buddha Boy, The Blue Mirror, Talk, Going Under, Kissing the Bee and Headlong. And in yet a third stage she has written an Historical trilogy starting with Under the Poppy and continuing with The Mercury Waltz and The Bastards' Paradise: a love triangle, a brothel and puppets in the Victorian age.

Kathe has been active in theater, founding the theater company, nerve, in the Detroit area, mounting productions of Dracula and Faustus among others, making them immersive and interactive, using other media including puppets, dance, and music.

Encountering a writer as versatile and exciting as Kathe Koja is a great joy. She has a wicked sense of humor and is great fun in conversation. Make sure to meet her and to talk to her and wait for the fireworks.

### MINNESOTA FANTASY AWARD WINNER: ALLEN ANDERSON, 1908-1995

Allen Anderson was born in Minneapolis in 1908. The youngest of two brothers, the son of a cook, he studied art via The Federal Schools of Minneapolis (a correspondence art school), graduating in 1928. For the next ten years he worked as a journeyman artist at Fawcett Publications, then based in Robbinsdale,



and became close friends with fellow Minnesota artist Norman Saunders. When Fawcett relocated to New York, Anderson, like many of his fellow artists, moved with them. In the years to follow he would produce cover art for many publishers and magazines, and across a gamut of genres: SF, Mystery, Western--hiscareer interrupted somewhat by WWII. In 1949 he also ventured into comic books, painting some covers for Ziff-Davis. In 1953, with the Pulp markets failing, he remarried and moved to Tillson, NY where he supported himself by doing advertising work, the occasional cover or illustration for such markets as remained, and even working as a sign painter. He died on October 23, 1995 at the age of 87.
